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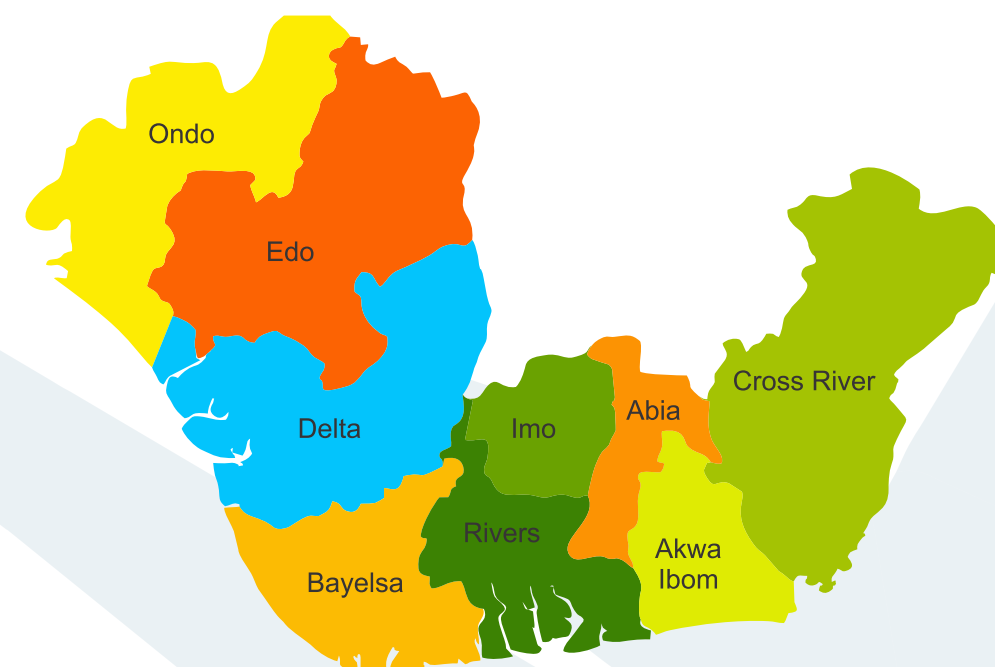

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# PROJECT BACKGROUND

Leadership Initiative for Transformation and Empowerment (LITE-Africa) is a Nigerian non-governmental organization (NGO) operating in Nigeria since 1999 with a vision to create a safe space for peace and development action, and a mission to facilitate community and human development, foster good governance and create inclusive and diverse networks and collaborations in Nigeria and beyond. The organisation designs and implements programs and projects in three thematic areas: Governance & Human Rights, Sustainable Livelihoods & Health, and Humanitarian Support Services.

The Africa Network for Environment and Economic Justice (ANEEJ) is a non-governmental organization whose goal is to amplify the voice of the weak, the less privileged and the marginalized groups in the society including women and youths, in order to increase their participation in the democratic decision-making process. ANEEJ operates within two broad focal areas namely environment and economic justice. Specifically, ANEEJ implements projects relating to governance and democracy, anti-corruption and human rights, peace building and conflict resolution, environment including water, sanitation and hygiene among others.

Both organizations are implementing the Strengthening Advocacy and Civic Engagement project aimed at improving the effectiveness of Niger Delta Institutions. LITE-Africa's four-year project is entitled - Promoting Effective Niger Delta Institutions through Social Accountability (PENDISA) while that of ANEEJ is entitled Strengthening CSOs Capacity to engage with Niger Delta Institutions on Resource Management.

To achieve the project overarching objective of effective public resource management for inclusive socio-economic development of the Niger Delta, a Citizens' Report Card (CRC) assessment of the Niger Delta Institutions was carried out in 44 communities in the 9 Niger Delta States; Abia, Akwa-Ibom, Bayelsa, Cross Rivers, Delta, Edo, Imo, Ondo and Rivers with the aim of gathering information on citizens' perception and activities of the NDIs.

# ABOUT THE NIGER DELTA

The Niger Delta is an oil-rich region consists of nine states: Abia, Akwa-Ibom, Bayelsa, Cross River, Delta, Edo, Imo, Ondo, and Rivers. There is a population of 20 million and over forty different ethnic groups. Since 1975, the oil produced in the Delta has accounted for 90% of Nigeria's export earnings, yet it remains one of the most under-developed regions in Nigeria. Overtime, oil production activities in the Niger Delta have caused severe socio-economic and environmental consequences to the indigenous people on whose land these activities have been carried out. The revenues derived from oil extraction have not contributed to meaningful development in these communities. Also, the welfare of the people of the Niger Delta has neither improved nor been adequately addressed by successive governments and the multi-national companies who operate joint ventures in oil exploration.

The region has been noted by several researchers, governmental and non-governmental organizations all over the world to be suffering from administrative neglect, crumbling social infrastructure and services, high unemployment, social deprivation, abject poverty, filth and squalor and endemic conflict (USIP,2011; UNDP,2006).

Decades of lingering unrest and instability arising from perceived neglect and marginalization led the Federal and various State government to establish interventionist agencies such as the Ministry of Niger Delta Affairs (MNDA), Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC), States Oil and Gas Development Commissions (ASOPADEC, DESOPADEC, EDSOGPADEC, ISOPADEC, and OSOPADEC,) with the purpose of fast tracking the economic development of the region and address poverty and agitation. These efforts at initiating development in the region have mostly been subverted by widespread corruption, unhealthy rivalry, mistrust, the exploitative relationship between the government and oil companies and the oil bearing communities, violent socio-political crises and alienation. Paradoxically, these are the same forces that precipitated underdevelopment and poverty in the region. Neither the government nor international donors and civil society actors have been able to curb violence and create sustainable peace and development in the Niger Delta.

# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

From June through July 2015, and June to July 2017 LITE-Africa and ANEEJ programme officers carried out 96 focus group discussions and 117 KIIs, with 1932 community residents in 44 communities, 17 Local Government Areas (LGA) and 9 States in the Niger Delta- Abia, Akwa-Ibom, Bayelsa, Cross Rivers, Delta, Edo, Imo, Ondo and Rivers. The 2017 assessment focused on the five states that were not covered in the 2015 assessment. The combination of both findings provided a comprehensive citizens' report card of the 9 Niger Delta states regarding issues of accountability, inclusion and impact of development projects carried out in communities in various sectors including health, education, water, electricity, housing, security, human capital development, environment and transport by the NDIs.

The CRC serves as an accountability tool which provides community residents feedback on the effectiveness, mandate, policies and activities of the NDIs. Thus, it amplifies the voices of community residents to a wider audience, which will help place them at the centre of policy discourse on decisions that affect their lives. Government agencies can also utilize this community-level data to guide their development policies, decisions, and allocation of funding to Niger Delta communities.

The CRC reveals that development interventions in the Niger Delta need to be re-focused to meet the needs of community residents. It reveals poor planning in some cases, failure to properly incorporate community needs in the development decision processes and lack of coordination among the NDIs leading to duplication, abandoned and sub-standard projects. A total of 93 incomplete or abandoned projects were identified with Imo State topping the list followed by Akwa-Ibom, Ondo, Delta, Abia, River sand Edo States. Bayelsa and Cross Rivers states have the least number of abandoned projects. It was found that residents only associate the Ministry of Niger Delta Affairs with the East West road, and many of the community residents neither had heard of nor knew the role of the ministry as Niger Delta residents struggled to fully understand the mandate of each of these development agencies and how to single out what each of these institutions stand to deliver in terms of development in the region.

The findings provide raw quality data on the living conditions of residents of rural and riverine communities. It also presents the responses of community members on the key developmental milestones recorded as a result of NDIs projects in their communities as well as the impact of poor policy implementation by the institutions.

The report contains documentation and analysis of captured data with charts and tables regarding issues of accountability, inclusion and impact of development projects carried out in communities in areas of health, education, water and electricity by the NDIs. This report focused mainly on projects implemented by the NDIs. However, in a few states like Rivers and Imo exceptions were made and some state government projects were assessed.

# RECOMMENDATIONS

These recommendations are general proposals to guide key policy reforms and enhance the effectiveness, accountability and transparency of the Niger Delta institutions in the management of public resource and socially inclusive programming, where applicable.

## Citizens' Participation

- The NDIs should embark on consultative meetings with communities before project selection and execution. This will not only ensure the implementation of people oriented programme but also afford the people a sense of ownership of such projects.
- A comprehensive need assessment component should be incorporated into the Acts establishing the public development agencies in the region to strengthen need based development and in-depth interaction between the public development agencies and commissions and benefitting communities.
- Community need assessment report should be regularly reviewed and updated to address the seeming challenge of political interference in the choice and allocation of projects.

## Coordination of Development Actions

- Inter-agency collaboration should be strengthened to synergize action plans in order to avoid duplication of projects which is a huge waste of public resource, and unhealthy competition.
- States based inter-ministerial and inter-agency budget synergy in collaboration with development partners is strongly recommended to address the challenge of duplication of efforts. Annual joint project planning meeting before budget preparation will greatly help to strengthen collaboration and coordination among the agencies, commissions and ministries.
- Periodic stakeholders forum is recommended to create avenue for learning, information sharing and joint problem solving among agencies in project planning and implementation.

## Improved Monitoring and Oversight Function

- Joint project monitoring teams comprising representatives of the commissions, communities, CSOs and the media should be set up to carry out effective monitoring and supervision of projects implementation to ensure quality assurance and check substandard and abandoned projects. This would further promote accountability and improve public perception about the commissions.
- NDDC has inaugurated an independent CSOs project monitoring team which has embarked on the first phase of monitoring NDDC projects across the region. The commission should sustain and strengthen this collaboration by developing appropriate mechanisms for the monitoring exercise including sharing of the reports.

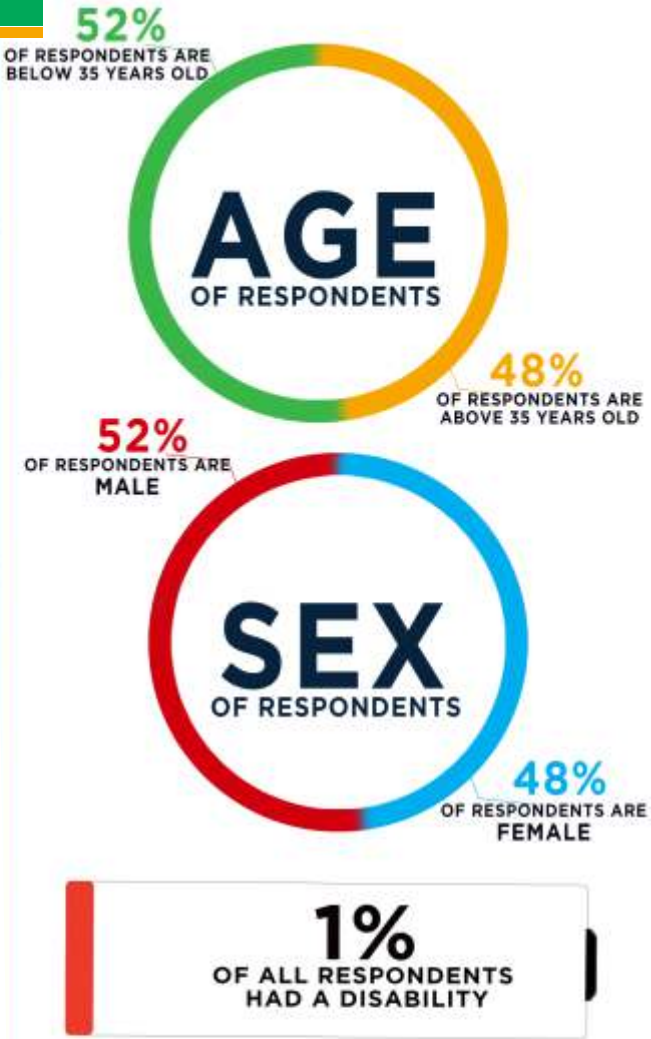
- The various state oil and gas development agencies should borrow a leaf from the NDDC transparency initiative by setting up their own joint project monitoring teams.

Public Awareness on Mandate and Policies

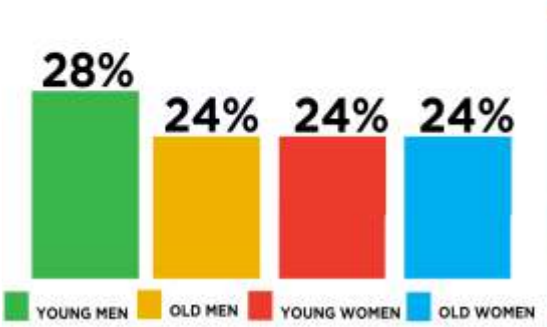
- The various state oil and gas development commissions should make efforts to share information on developmental activities; including budgets and budget cycles, project allocation and annual reports highlighting ongoing and completed projects in public domain, particularly on the commissions' official website to promote transparency and change public perception through accessible information. The NDDC publication of budgets and comprehensive quarterly reports on the commission's website is a good example for the PADECs to follow.
- NDIs should regularly update their website to provide the public easy access to updated information about the commissions' activities. The ones that do not have official website should develop one as such practice portrays a public institution in bad light.
- There is the need to heighten public awareness on the activities of the commissions at the communities, local councils and states to address the knowledge gap and poor public perception about the mandate and activities of the NDIs. Workshop and in-service training for staff and effective collaboration with CSOs is strongly recommended.

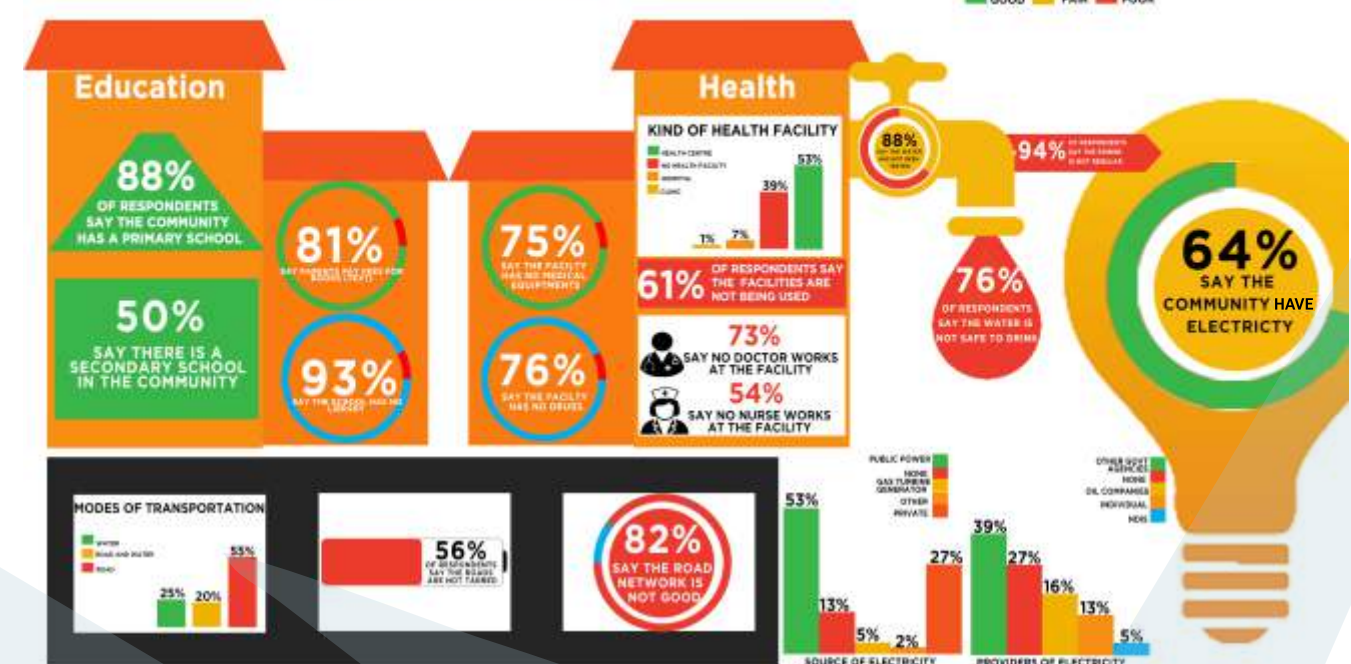
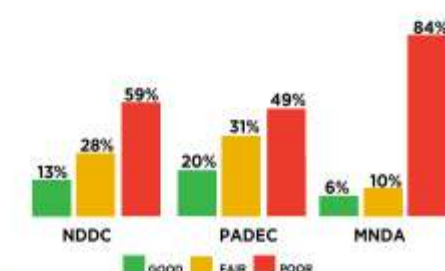




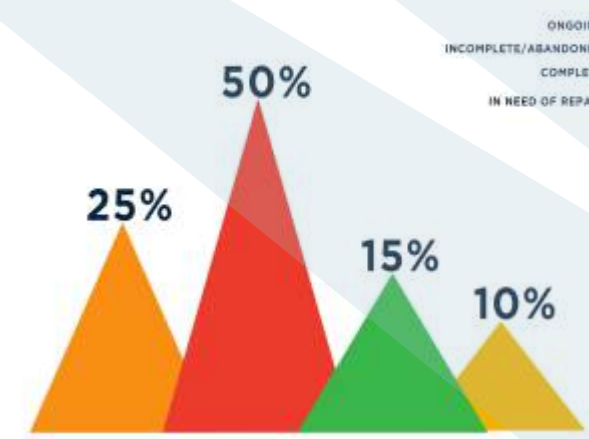
# PROJECT STATUS & PROJECT SPONSORS FOR NIGER DELTA STATES



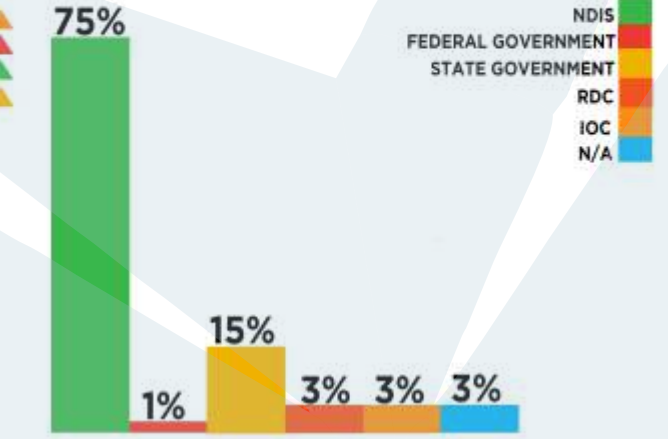
RELATIONSHIP OF COMMUNITIES WITH NDIs

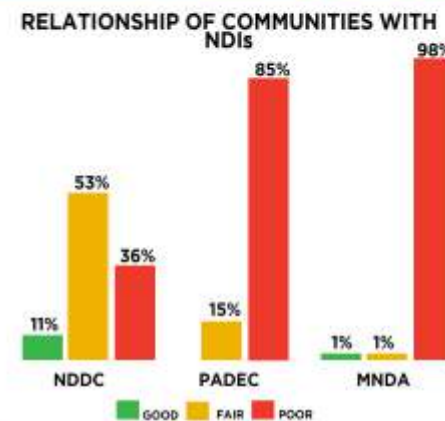

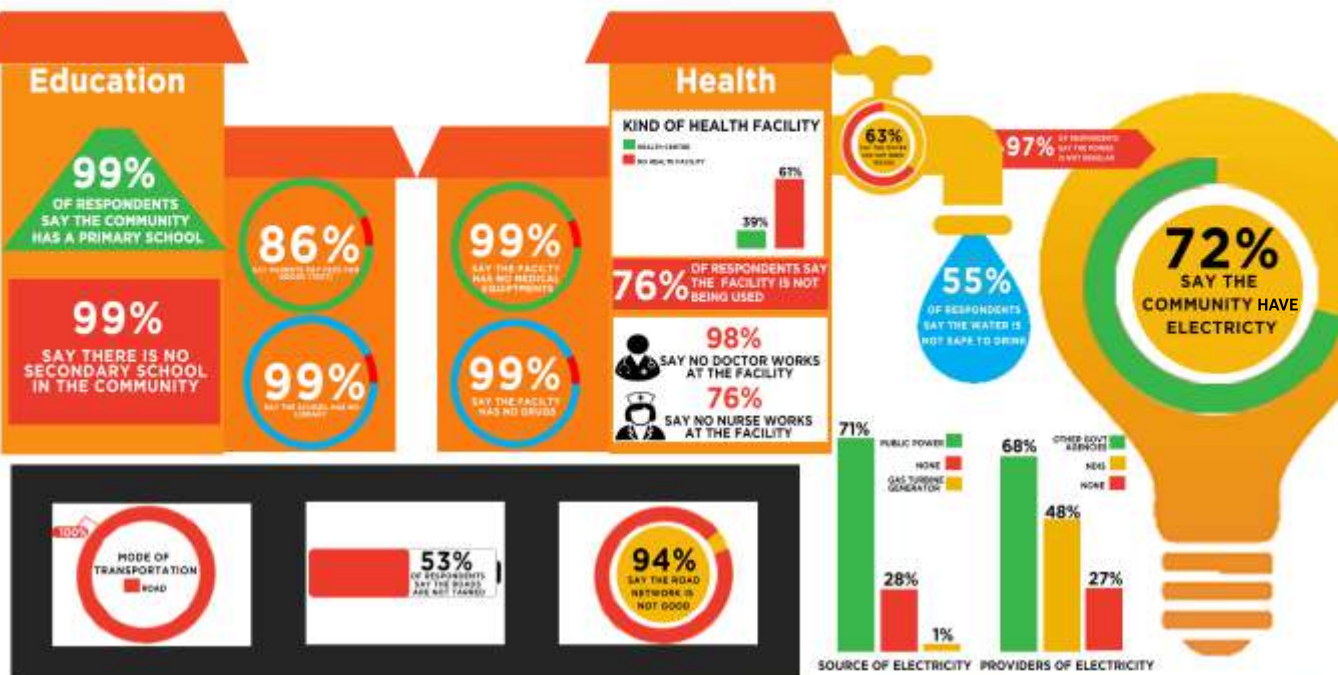

RELATIONSHIP OF COMMUNITIES WITH NDIs



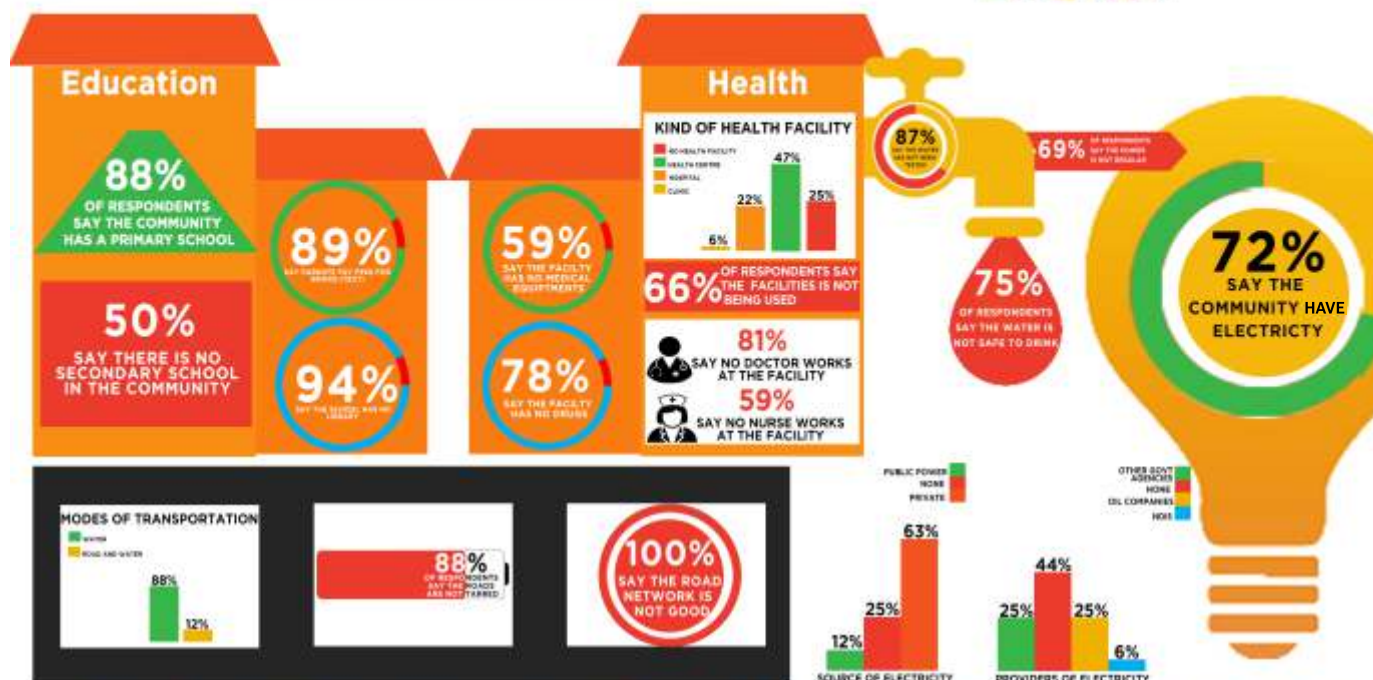
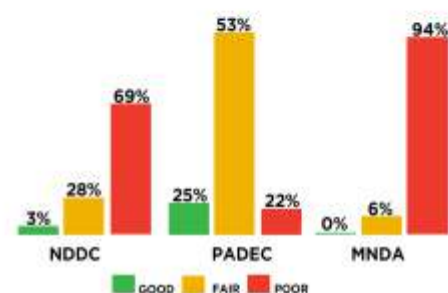
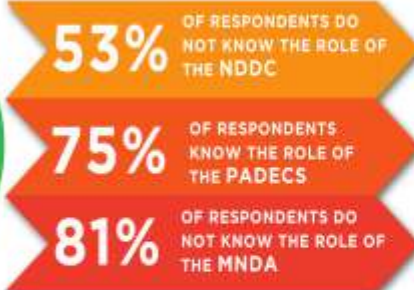

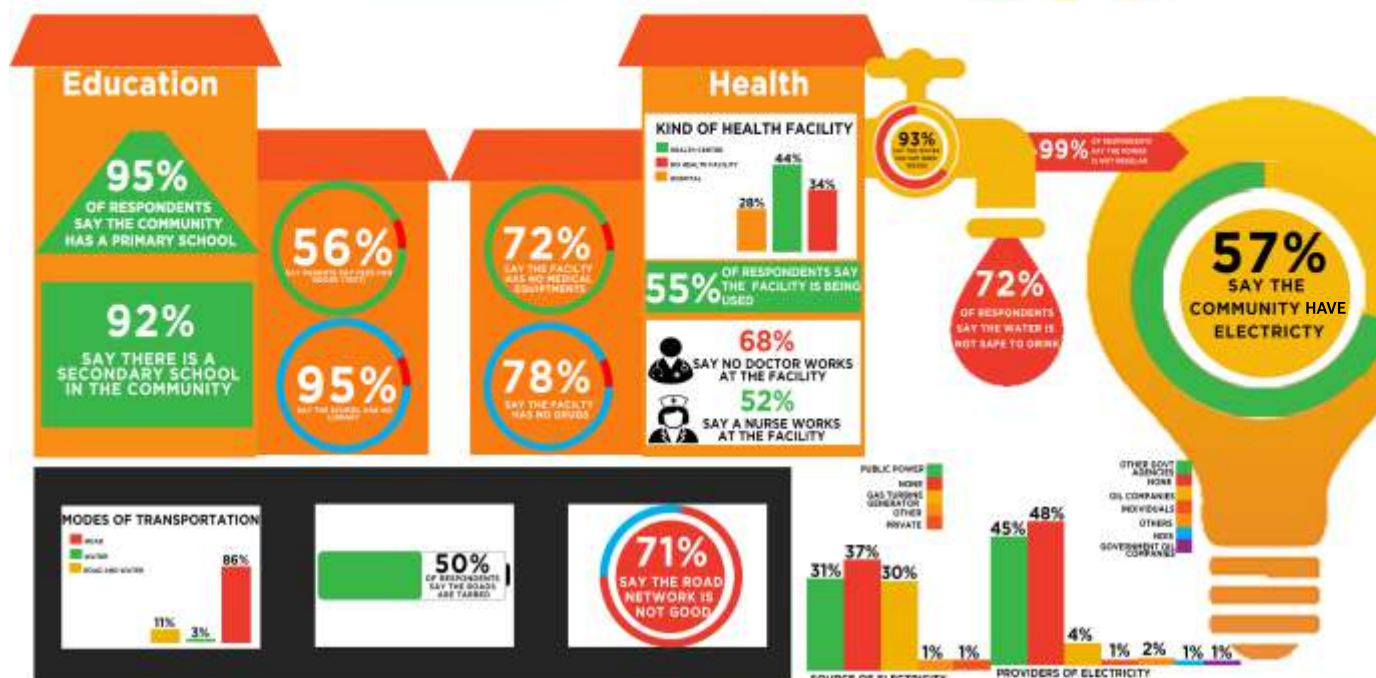
RELATIONSHIP OF COMMUNITIES WITH NDIs

THE NIGER DELTA INSTITUTION TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY INDEX

Following the facts that emerged from the Citizens Report Card jointly carried out by ANEEJ and LITE Africa in the first phase of the SACE project, it became expedient to deepen our work in the area of transparency and accountability of the Niger Delta Institutions. At ANEEJ, we felt it will be good to use technology to strengthen the operations of targeted institutions through the Niger Delta Transparency and Accountability Index (NDITI).

The NDITI is an online platform that objectively measures the performance of Niger Delta Institutions in real time with regards to the level of transparency and accountability. The unit of measurement is the 49 indicators on the platform that align to the principles of transparency grouped under five categories such as;

- Access to information and public disclosure,
- Synergy with other NDIs/Niger Delta development agencies and government agencies
- Consultation with communities/other stakeholders and inclusion,
- Transparency in procurement process and
- Institutions’ integrity

There are seven institutions on the platform such as;Abia State Oil Producing Areas Development Commission (ASOPADEC), Delta State Oil Producing Areas Development Commission (DESOPADEC), Edo State Oil and Gas Producing Areas Development Commission (EDSOGPADEC), Imo State Oil Producing Areas Development Commission (ISOPADEC), the Federal Ministry of Niger Delta Affair (MNDIA), Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) and Ondo State Oil Producing Areas Development Commission (OSOPADEC).

The NDITI was launched December 15, 2017 on the **DYNTRA** platform <http://www.dyntra.org/en/transparency-indices/niger-delta-institutions/>





The NDITI provides holistic information of the NDIs on the same platform. Some of the objectives of the NDITI is to promote efficient, transparent and accountable Institutions in the region, healthy competition, measure the performance of the institutions as well as and increase citizen engagement in the activities of the NDIs.

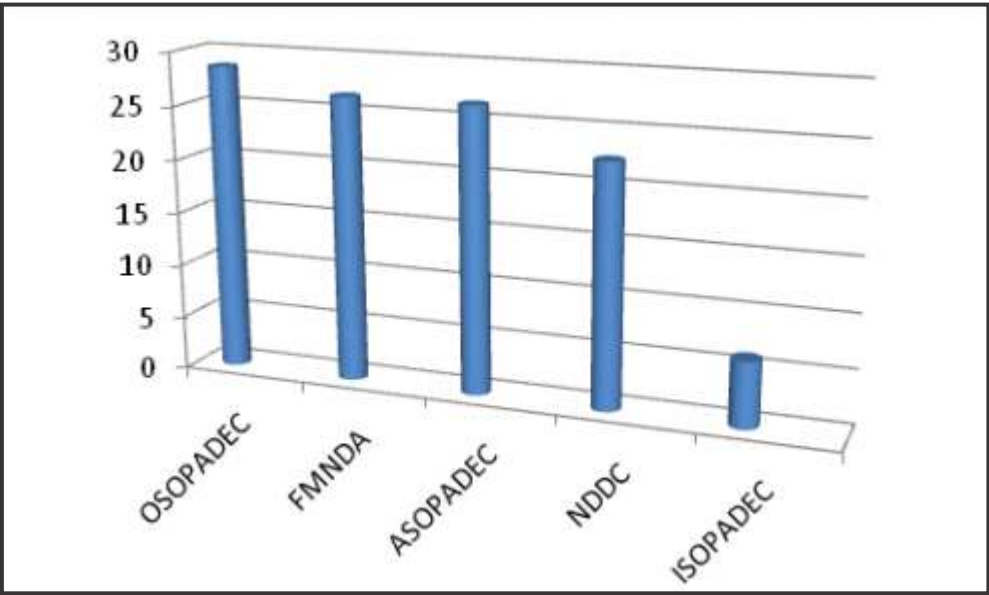
This project is the second phase of the Strengthening Civil Society Capacity to Engage the Niger- delta institutions on Resource Management under the Strengthening Advocacy and Civic Engagement (SACE) project funded by USAID and PIND.

During the first phase of the SACE/USAID Project, ANEEJ and LITE-Africaworked collaboratively alongside their cluster members to carried out an assessment of Niger Delta Institutions (NDIs) such as NDDC, Ministry of Niger Delta Affairs, EDSOGPADEC, OSOPADEC and DESOPADEC to get a deeper understanding of their mandates and activities and conducted a citizen report card survey on the institutions in some of the oil producing communities across the Niger Delta region.

OUTCOME OF THE NIGER DELTA INSTITUTIONS TRANSPARENCY (PHASE 1)

Five of the Niger Deltainstitutions activity report is currently on the platform, the information is drawn from the institution's official website. Below is the result of the first evaluation conducted in Port Harcourt, March 27-28, 2018, by ANEEJ for NDIs Staff, CSOs and Media.

GRAPHICAL INTERPRETATION OF THE FIRST EVALUATION RESULT AS AT MARCH, 2018

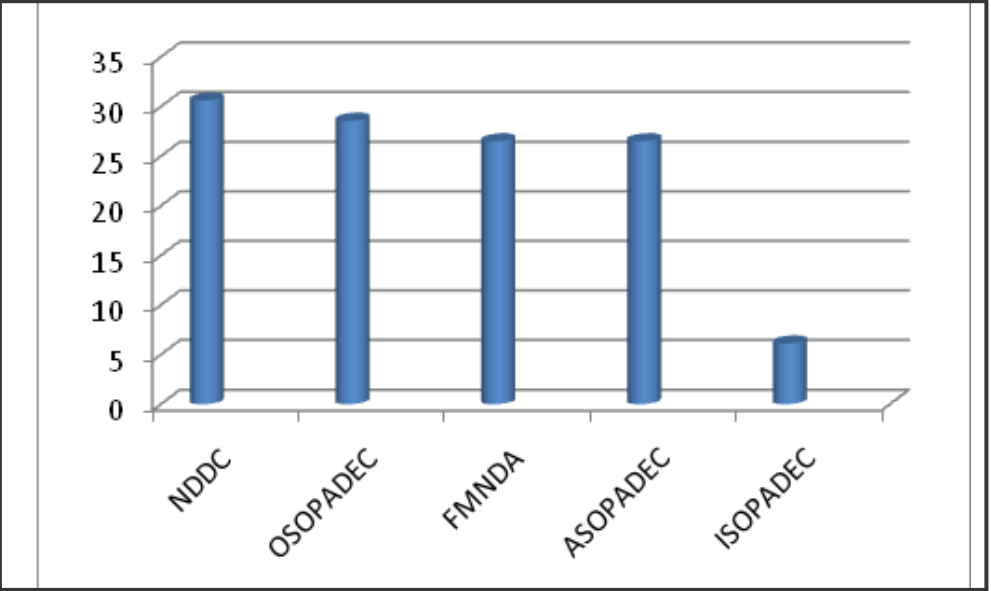

The Niger Delta Institutions Transparency Index shows the real time updates of the programmes and performance of NDIs in terms of transparency. It therefore gives the responsibility to the NDIs to prove how transparent and accountable they are in managing the resources through public disclosure of information, collaboration with other NDIs and agencies, level of consultation with communities & stakeholders, procurement process and Institutions' integrity. The information generated on the Niger Delta institutions is derived from the institution's website. Just like the Citizens Report Card (CRC) shows the current status of projects implemented by NDIs in the different communities and community perception on the impact of projects.

Technology and information empowers society to attain quicker development. The Niger Delta Institutions Transparency Index is a tool that opens public access to generating information from NDIs to citizens and Civil Society Organizations to create awareness, participation and engagement in an informed way that lead to greater development of the region in line with the mandates of the Niger Delta region.
